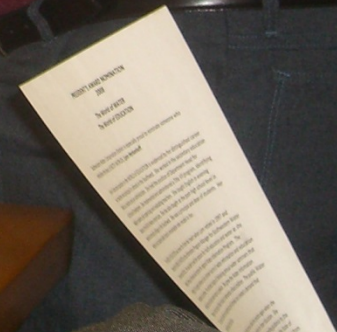
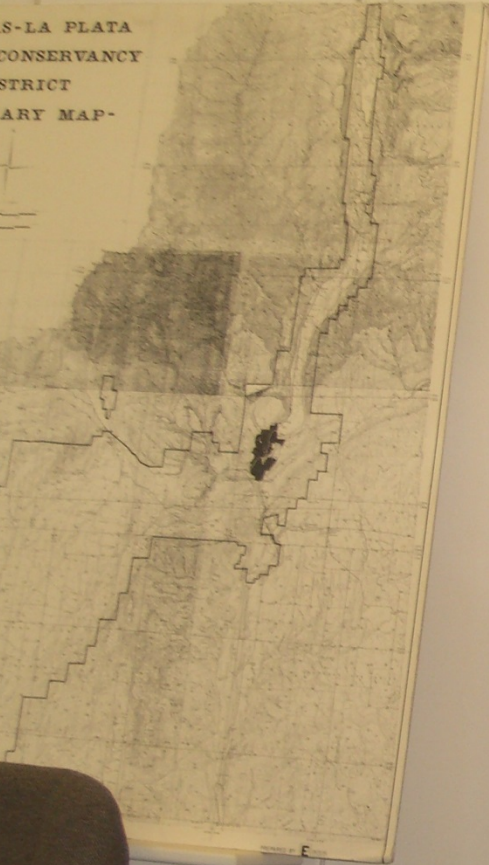

Dedicated to the many pioneers that recognized the potential and value to our Valley of a gravity irrigation system, and the sacrifices made obtaining it:

In particular, to honor the following three persons, whose contributions uniquely contributed to the construction of our Dam, and to the early development of the Palo Verde Valley:

O.P. Calloway (1820 - 1880)

The adventurer-explorer who had the original vision of a vibrant Palo Verde Valley, fed by the waters of the Colorado River.

Ed Williams (1866 - 1954)

Without whose early efforts in fighting an untamed river, the Valley may have been lost to the elements and forces of nature.

Wayne H. Fisher (1892 - 1962)

Without whose efforts in re-organizing and re-financing the Valley during the Great Depression, our farmers may have been lost to despair and to bankruptcy.
